Mrs. Garrett Weds

In April of 1902, Baltimore society was caught off guard when Mrs. Mary Frick Garrett, the widow of B&O Railroad President Robert Garrett, quietly married her family physician, Dr. Henry Barton Jacobs. While the event came as a surprise, the city's upper crust had noted their friendship. One suspicious acquaintance even boldly asked if an engagement between the two would be announced. Mrs. Garrett responded that no announcement would be made. True to her word, there was no announcement. Instead, Mrs. Garrett donned a pink silk dress and rode her carriage to Grace Protestant Episcopal Church (now Grace & St. Peters), where she and Dr. Jacobs were wed with little fanfare.

The two had met years before, when Dr. Jacobs moved from Boston to Baltimore in the 1880s to serve as the ailing Robert Garrett's private physician (Mr. Garrett died in 1896). In light of chatter about their relationship, Baltimore newspapers were quick to point out Dr. Jacobs' "distinguished" ancestry (he was descended from at least seven Mayflower passengers). Reporters also stressed the agreement signed by both parties that separated their respective assets—Dr. Jacobs was not marrying one of America's richest women for her money.

The marriage was reported in newspapers across the country, and even luminaries like J.P. Morgan had something to say. "My my," he reportedly told friends. "What do you think? Mrs. Garrett has married." But it was her own household that was the most taken aback. Before leaving for the ceremony, Mary Frick informed her longtime secretary, A.B. Crane, of her nuptials and directed him to tell the staff. According to the *Baltimore Sun*, the news "reduced the household to an utter state of collapse," with Mary Frick's head housekeeper opining that she was "too dazed to even congratulate or wish her happiness or even suggest her having lunch."
